



Seeing what needs to be done and doing it

Victor Hugo defined initiative as "doing the right thing without being told. Many a parent would agree with Mr. Hugo here! When you see something that needs to be done, it's usually not wrong to go ahead and do it. It really stands out to BE that person that first of all notices what needs to be done and then takes it a step further and does it!

Character Building

As a family, sit down and discuss things that need to be done at home. What are some needs in the family? Examples might include home improvements, cleaning out closets and donating old clothes and shoes, fixing car issues, resolving relationship issues, etc. Make a goal each week to identify a need and do something about it. Come to the table once the week is finished and discuss ways that each member demonstrated initiative.





How Can I Help My Child Who Is Struggling To Read

- Help your child choose books at his or her reading level.
- Consider checking out books on tape.
- Create a reader-friendly home by monitoring screen-time.

night, you will have read abut 365 books in a year. That is 730 books in two years and 1095 books in three years. If you consider that most children start kindergarten at around 5 years of age, you have more time than you think (so get started).





- Stay in touch with your child's school/ teacher




- Create a schedule and routine for learning at home
